TRAINING THE CANINE GOOD CITIZEN

Learn to train your own, or borrowed, dog, become an entry level trainer/evaluator, and earn experience working with two species at one time. This course will introduce you to the concept of dog training, evaluating a dog as a candidate for this training, and teaching a dog to be a good citizen. You will have the opportunity to train a dog, teach people, and create curriculum. **Required:** A printout from your vet showing your dog is up-to-date on vaccines, heartworm testing, and fecal testing, along with a photo of your dog. And if this is a borrowed dog, a letter of consent to use from the owner. Prior to the start of class. **Materials Fee: \$5, payable at last class for mock testing. Optional Fee: If dog, passes mock class \$20-25 to file paperwork with AKC for a certificate.**

PET FIRST AID & CPR

Do you work in the pet industry or just want to acquire knowledge on how to respond in a pet emergency? Learning what you can do in the first 15-25 seconds on the scene is critical and can save a pet's life. You will learn how to assess vital signs, when a veterinarian is needed, how to immobilize, to manage shock and to transport, as well as how to manage breathing, cardiac emergencies, administering medicine and treating wounds (under advisement of a veterinarian) and more. Lastly, what to put in a pet first aid kit and available apps to help as reminders.

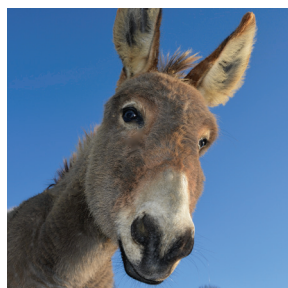
PET SAFETY FOR THE PROFESSIONAL

Repairmen, pet care professionals, home care aids, EMT's, fireman, and policeman, learn the tools and techniques to protect yourself and the pet from injury. Each day about 1,000 people require emergency care treatment for pet bites and more than 50% happen in the home or a familiar place. Family pets with no prior history of aggression may bite when in pain or feeling that they or their family are being threatened. Knowing the correct way to approach a pet on their territory is critical.
